MESSAGE FROM THE PART C COORDINATOR

We recently wrapped up our annual family questionnaire, and quantitative results and open-ended responses have been distributed to each county. I am thrilled to share that the statewide response rate to the questionnaire was over 29% for the third year in a row, after several years of substantial increases. Thank you to the local county programs for all your work in engaging families in this process and, more importantly, the meaningful work you do to support these families day in and day out.

I look forward to reviewing the family questionnaire responses every year. It is incredibly important to hear directly from the families we serve to determine what is working well in the program and where we can make improvements. Further, these responses are a great reminder of the substantial impact the EI program has on these children and families during their time in EI and long after they exit.

I have shared a handful of quotes below (with identifying information removed) from responses we received to this year's questionnaire that particularly highlight the incredible impact your work makes on the children and families we serve.

"When talking with anyone involved in Early Intervention, you can immediately sense how deeply they care about what they do and how passionate they are about helping parents understand the resources and support that can help their child thrive. It can be incredibly disheartening to compare your child to others and focus on the ways they may seem behind, but this program helps shift the focus toward progress, growth, and everything they have already overcome. Early Intervention truly helps set children and families up for success by celebrating each step of the journey."

"The biggest impact has been learning strategies that we can use in our daily routines to support our child's development. The encouragement and guidance from our Early Intervention team have helped us recognize progress and better understand our child's strengths and challenges. Having support early on has made us feel more prepared to advocate for our child's needs."

"The biggest impact of early intervention on our family has been the support and guidance we have received from our therapists. They have helped us understand our child's needs and taught us activities and strategies to encourage communication, learning, and development at home. They have also helped us connect with valuable community resources, including assistance with diapers, educational toys, and other services our child needs. Their encouragement and support have given us confidence and made a positive difference in our child's progress and in our family's daily life."

“Early Intervention has worked very well for our family because of the individualized support, communication, and guidance provided throughout the process. The therapists were patient, encouraging, and gave us practical strategies to use during everyday routines at home. We appreciated how family centered the services were and how they focused on helping our child build communication skills in a natural and supportive way. We have seen meaningful progress in our child’s speech and confidence, and we are very grateful for the support our family received.”

“Enrolling my son in Early Intervention has been an incredible blessing for our family because it allowed him to receive therapy services both at home and at daycare. What has worked especially well has been the support and guidance provided not only to my son, but to me as a parent. The staff truly listened to my concerns and fears regarding my son’s developmental challenges and helped me feel supported throughout the process. They provided valuable recommendations for a daycare that would best fit his specific needs, suggested local resources and activities to help support his development, and guided me through the IEP transition process so he would continue receiving support after aging out of EI. They also helped me learn new strategies and ways of approaching things at home that better support his growth and development. Overall, EI has made a tremendous positive impact on both my son and our entire family.”

Upcoming Transfer of EI Coursework from DODD MyLearning to the Ohio Professional Registry

By the end of the 2026 calendar year, all [EI coursework](#) currently housed in DODD MyLearning will be transferred to the Ohio Professional Registry (OPR). After the courses are transferred to the OPR, they will no longer be accessible in DODD MyLearning. See the information below regarding what you can expect and action steps you can take now to prepare for this transfer.

What you can expect:

- Regular guidance, reminders, and updates in the EI Program Updates
- Reminders on DODD MyLearning course pages regarding deadlines to enroll in and complete coursework in DODD MyLearning (to be announced at a later date)
- Guidance documents outlining how to locate, enroll in, and complete the EI courses in the OPR

Action steps you can take now to prepare:

- If you have not already done so, [create an OPR profile](#).
- Plan to complete any EI coursework you have started in MyLearning by early December. Exact deadlines will be communicated at a later date.

2027 Early Hearing Detection & Intervention Conference

Reminder: Principles of Service Coordination Test-Out Option for Transition Credential Holders

Individuals with **EISC Transition** and **EISC Supervisor Transition** credentials are eligible to complete the Test-Out option for Principles of Service Coordination (POSC) Modules 1, 2, 4, and 5. These Test-Out options can be found [here](#). Learners are required to take Modules 3, 6, and 7 in their entirety, as there are no Test-Out options for these modules.

To access the Test-Out exams:

1. Use the enrollment code (if applicable) to enroll in the Test-Out exam. If an enrollment code is required, it can be found on the certificate of the preceding module in the series or on the MyLearning transcript in the “Other” column next to the preceding module.
2. Upload the required documents (copy of **Transition** credential and certificate of completion for preceding module or test-out exam) into the “Pre-requisite” section. **Note: Individuals who do not have a credential marked as “Transition” are not eligible to complete the Test-Out exams.**
3. Once these documents are approved by the administrator (up to 5 business days), complete the exam. If learners fail the exam, they must complete the corresponding module in its entirety.
